Learning for Sustainability

Solutions Not Sides workshops embrace the principles outlined in the Learning for Sustainability (http://learningforsustainabilityscotland.org/learn-more/) mission and visions statement by building students' capacity to contribute sustainably on a local, national, and international level through critical thinking skills, conflict resolution, and awareness raising of global issues. Students are encouraged to have discussions about social justice and equality, democracy, and act as global citizens in promoting sustainable societies worldwide. The interactive element of our workshops means that students are learning by doing and engaging.

Modern Studies

Our workshops apply to wider studies of the modern world and international conflict. A foundation on the causes and effects of the Israel-Palestine conflict on the world around us is covered alongside the history of international involvement and negotiations in the attempt for a resolution.

- Causes of the issue: nature and extent of the world issue; political, social and economic factors that give rise to the international issue.
- Effects of the issue on: individuals, countries and their governments; the international community.
- Attempts to resolve the issue: role and effectiveness of individual countries; role and effectiveness of international organisations.
