As educators, it is our responsibility not only to ensure we use quality sources, but to make sure our students do to. This guide is here to make that process easier for everyone.

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A Short Guide

- 1. **Diverse sources of information**: encourage students to obtains news from a variety of sources in order to minimise bias and gain a well-rounded perspective.
- 2. **Critical Thinking**: teach critical-thinking skills to help students evaluate the credibility & reliability of sources
- 3. **Fact-Checking**: with the rise of misinformation circulating the media, instill the habit of fact-checking using reputable fact-checking organisations and tools.
- 4. **Question Everything**: encourage students to ask critical questions about the sources, claims, and evidence presented in the media/social media.
- 5. **Ethical sharing**: emphasise the responsibility of sharing accurate information and the potential consequences of spreading misinformation.
- 6. **Open Dialogues**: foster discussions in the classroom about media literacy, current events, and the ethical responsibilities of both media outlets and individuals.


